2021-2022 Program Data



COMPLETED HOME VISITS AND FAMILY ADVOCACY VISITS

- Home Visits
- Total 2,315 completed home visits for 194 families
 - Center 339 completed home visits for 124 families
 - Home-Based Head Start 291 completed home visits for 10 families
 - Home-Based Early Head Start 1,685 completed home visits for 60 families

- Family Advocacy Visits
- 933 completed visits for 142 families
 - Center only



CHOOSY HEALTHY HABIT CHAINS (CENTER-BASED)









- Every link in the chain represents a healthy habit our children and families practiced
- Children brought home a weekly calendar for parents to document when they practiced healthy habits at home
 - Eating healthy
 - Getting enough rest
 - Getting exercise



ASQ:SE

(AGES AND STAGES QUESTIONNAIRE: SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL HEALTH)

207 ASQ:SE screenings completed by families during Welcome Packet Visits

- 167 screenings resulted in no concerns
- 19 screenings resulted in further monitoring
 - 0 required referrals for a classroom observation
- 21 resulted in referral for a classroom/home visit observation

2021-2022 SOCIAL EMOTIONAL HEALTH OUTCOMES

- 21 ASQ:SE assessments indicated social-emotional developmental concerns
- 4 families declined initial observation
- 17 children received an observation from Greater Minnesota
 - 15 of those observations resulted in further assessment.
 - · 4 children received observations and families unable to commit to follow up assessment
 - 7 families received services from Greater Minnesota
 - 4 dropped before assessment was completed
- 3 children came into the program already receiving services



GREATER MN FAMILY SERVICES SEED PROGRAM (SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL ENHANCEMENT DEVELOPMENT)

- 7 children attended SEED classroom
- 4 families declined services
- 4 children on waitlist to attend SEED classroom



HEAD START AND EARLY HEAD START PHYSICAL EXAMS

157 HS children served

74% received a Physical exam




- Total 72 EHS children served
- 46 % are up to date on Well Baby exams

HEAD START AND EARLY HEAD START DENTAL EXAMS

- Total I57 HS children served
- Dental exams or screenings 134 or 85%
- Total 71 EHS children served
- Dental exams or screenings 40 or 55%

 Several children are on a waitlist for Children's Dental Services in Nobles and Rock Counties

 There is a also a new dental clinic in Pipestone called Caring Hands Dental who we will be collaborating with to provide better access for our children in Pipestone, Rock, and Murray Counties



HEAD START AND EARLY HEAD START DENTAL

Head Start Children Needed treatment – 62

- 19 completed treatment
- 23 still need a dental exam
- 3 children have been referred to dentists for treatment follow-up
- Will continue to work with returning families to complete treatment

EHS Children Needed Treatment – I

- Received Treatment from Children's Dental Services – 2
- Referred for treatment to ABC Dental I
- 33 children still need a dental exam
 - Of the 33 children, 14 children dropped before they could be seen
 - One was too young and dropped before they could be seen

CHILDREN'S DENTAL CLINIC

- Head Start hosted 8 mobile dental clinic days, starting July 2021 through May 2022
- Clinic started at 8:00 a.m. and ended at 5:00 p.m.
- 130 children served (not including siblings of children enrolled)
 - 16 children completed treatment
 - 40 children will be returning to continue treatment
 - I child monitor for sensitivity and potential need for treatment
 - 2 referred to other dentists
 - I scheduled at the Cities
 - I referred to the Cities due to extensive dental treatment
 - During their visits, CDS partnered with Delta Dental to handout backpacks with toothpaste, toothbrushes, floss, stickers, water bottles and other goodies for the children



Children's Dental Services

HEAD START AND EARLY HEAD START HEARING AND VISION SCREENINGS

Head Start

- Hearing screenings 100% complete
- 8 screenings identified need for follow up
 - I child followed up with medical provider
 - 7 parents weren't concerned based upon their knowledge of child
 - 5 screenings expired
 - 2 children dropped before they were screened
 - 3 child unable to be screened

Early Head Start

- Hearing screenings 58 out of 71 children passed their screening – 81%
 - 6 children haven't been in the program for 30 days
 - 6 children dropped before they were screened
 - I child was recently born (infant)





Head Start Vision screenings – 100% complete 53 needed a complete eye exam

- 12 had exams by optometrist
- 14 children had glasses
- 7 parents weren't concerned based upon their knowledge of child
- 4 exams expired
 - 2 children dropped before they were screened

EHS Vision screenings – 59 out of 71 children passed their screening– 83%

- 6 children haven't been in the program for 30 days
- 5 children dropped before they were screened
- I child was recently born (infant)

INDIVIDUAL EDUCATION PLAN

Referrals to school for Educational Concerns – 31

- Total of IEP students (Head Start) 16
- Total of IFSP students (Early Head Start) 3



SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Young children's social and emotional development involves:

- learning how to understand their own and others' feelings
- developing skills to regulate and express their emotions appropriately
- building relationships with others and interacting in groups

By the close of the 2021-22 school year, 96.9% of all our 4 year olds were meeting or exceeding age-appropriate expectations in the area of Social and Emotional Development.



LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

Language development involves:

- listening to and understanding language
- using language to express thoughts and needs
- learning conversation and communication skills



96.9% of our 4 year olds were meeting or exceeding age-appropriate expectations in the Language Development in 2021-22 school year.

COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT

Coginitive development includes a child's ability to:

- attend to and persist to tasks
- solve problems
- be curious and motivated to learn



96.9% of our four year olds were meeting or exceeding ageappropriate expectations in the area of cognitive development by the end of the 2021-22 year.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

Physical development includes children's:

- large muscle skills running, kicking and throwing a ball, jumping
- small muscle skills cutting with scissors, drawing, and writing



In the 2021-22 school year, 98% of our four year olds were meeting age-appropriate expectations for physical development.

MATHEMATICS DEVELOPMENT

In Math Development, young children learn about:

- numbers and counting
- shapes
- measuring and patterns
- data analysis



In this area, 96.9% of our four year olds were meeting or exceeding age-appropriate expectations at the close of the 2021-22 school year.


LITERACY DEVELOPMENT

Literacy learning begins at birth. During the preschool years, children are forming the foundation to read and write. This area of development includes:

- developing knowledge of the alphabet, letter sounds, and word recognition
- learning about print and its uses
- demonstrating writing skills

Physical




HEAD START HOME-BASED PROGRAM STRENGTHS

FAMILY GOALS

2020-2021

- 479 total goals made (213 families)
 - Average 2 goals per family
- 10% / 51 of the goals were completed
- 4% / 2 of the goals were abandoned


2021-2022

- 7% / 36 of the goals were abandoned


FAMILY GOALS TRENDS

- By Family Outcome:
 - Families as Advocates and Leaders 21% completed
 - Families as Learners 25% completed
 - Families as Lifelong Educators 48% completed
 - Family Connections to Peers and Community 16% completed
 - Family Engagement in Transitions 33% completed
 - Positive Parent-Child Relationships 22% completed





PARENT PARTICIPATION (JULY I THROUGH MAY 29)




POLICY COUNCIL ATTENDANCE

HEAD START CENTER-BASED ABSENCE REASONS

- September average monthly attendance was 85.16%
 - 53.28% Sick
 - 19.95% Other See Notes (Child tired, overslept, injury/pain/health issues, emergencies, etc.)
 - 17.68% COVID-19 Concerns
- December average monthly attendance was 80.81%
 - 35.62% COVID-19 concerns
 - 27.12% Sick
 - 14.79% Other See Notes
- January average monthly attendance was 60.04%
 - 46.12% Child Quarantine
 - 21.22% COVID-19 Concerns
 - 12.45% Sick



HEAD START CENTER-BASED ATTENDANCE DATA

- 35 out of 130 children had attendance over 90%.
- 95 children were chronically absent (had attendance below 90%)
 - 43 children set a Family Goal to improve their attendance, using Attendance Success
 Plan
 - 23 children met their Family Goal and received a book and Attendance Works certificate







 - Over-income children eligible for a Pathway II Scholarship (between 131-185 percentile)—12






